Colour Splash


Vienna April 26 – June 28, 2023

Three artists are the focus of <u>Galerie</u> <u>Gugging Vienna</u>'s new exhibition *Colour Splash:* Basel Al-Bazzaz, Helmut Hladisch and Karl Vondal.

Basel Al-Bazzaz, an artist born in Baghdad, Iraq, works in a social therapy print workshop. He predominantly creates fine, detailed works with small ornaments here and there in watercolours, pencil and coloured pencils. RV

Helmut Hladisch, who has lived in the Gugging House of Artists since 2013, draws from memory and depicts everyday objects or other familiar things from his surroundings in his own distinctive style.

Karl Vondal, who has lived and worked in the Gugging House of Artists since 2002, has a particular predilection for erotic depictions, which he repeatedly weaves texts around. His oeuvre is dominated by large-format, collage-like works on paper, created with pencil, coloured pencils and Indian ink in pastel colours.

Cuentos Nuevomexicanos

Currently on view at the <u>Museum of</u> <u>Contemporary Religious Art (MOCRA</u>), St. Louis, the exhibition *Cuentos Nuevomexicanos* features works by <u>Brandon Maldonado Vallejos</u> that explore the unique visual language of the early 19th Century saint makers of New Mexico.

A self-taught artist, Maldonado believes that art serves merely as a means to express an idea; the ideas brought forth from philosophy and religion have always been the realm of the muse for artists since the earliest cave paintings to the stained glass painted cathedrals.

Historical artists such as Jose Rafael Aragon disregarded academic tendencies in favour of a unique visual language of abstraction which deconstructs the imagery in true outsider sensibility.

I, Too, Am Thornton Dial

Louisiana March 30 – July 2, 2023

The exhibition <u>I, Too, Am Thornton</u>

<u>Dial</u> provides a thorough overview of work by the pivotal vernacular artist, including over seventy drawings, sculptures, paintings, and assemblages drawn from private and family collections.

Dial was born in 1928 to a sharecropping family in rural Alabama. His life was interwoven with poverty and tumultuous experience, having lived in the deep South through the Great Depression, Jim Crow segregation, and the Civil Rights movement.

After dropping out of school at age twelve and working a series of odd jobs, Dial found steady employment at the Pullman Standard Plant in Bessemer, Alabama. There he honed his skills at construction and metal work, laying a foundation for his artistic endeavours.

Dial began creating early-on, finding bits of odd scrap and debris, putting it together to make interesting forms that would decorate his home and yard. When the plant shut down in 1981, Dial devoted his time to creating artwork. He drew inspiration from his life experiences, blending complex themes like Civil Rights, race, class, and family into sophisticated arrangements crafted with found objects; everything from bones, wood, toys, metal, and clothing.

A <u>panel discussion</u> will be held on May 11, 2023, at 6 pm (CDT). It is free to attend. On the panel are: Paul Barrett, curator; Richard Dial, artist and son of Thornton Dial; Paul Arnett, art historian; Anne Collins Smith, cultural curator and art historian; and Michelle Schulte, senior curator and director of programs at the LSU Museum of Art.

> New York April 27 – June 16, 2023




