



GALERIE GUGGING:

simply... art

Klosterneuburg, Austria September 28, 2023 – February 11, 2024

Three great Gugging artists are featured in the autumn exhibition "simply... art" at the galerie gugging in Maria Gugging, Austria. The exhibition offers the opportunity to immerse yourself in the unique worlds of Franz Kamlander, Franz Kernbeis and Heinrich Reisenbauer.

Franz Kernbeis was born in 1935 in Prigglitz, Austria, and, like Kamlander, grew up on a farm. He lived in the House RV


of Artists in Gugging from 1981 until his death in 2019 and mainly processed impressions from everyday life in his art. The artist knew how to capture the essence of what he wanted to depict with simple means and few lines, and was subsequently able to let it emerge layer by layer in a touching three-dimensionality. Thus Kernbeis depicted, among other things, things from his surroundings and his past such as tractors, plants, buildings, bicycles, airplanes, or animals. He mainly used pencil and coloured pencils on small and large formats.

Franz Kamlander was born in 1920 in Hainburg, Austria, and grew up on a farm. The Gugging Artist lived in the House of Artists in Gugging from 1981 until his death in 1999. Among other things, he let his origins flow into numerous depictions of cows. Yellow, red, or blue cows sprang quickly and fluently from his pen. He had the talent to draw animals of all kinds.

Heinrich Reisenbauer was born in 1938 in Kirchau, Austria, and has lived in the House of Artists in Gugging since 1986. Reisenbauer is a renowned *art brut* artist, inspiring London fashion designer Christopher Kane with his serigraphic works for his Pre-Fall Collection 2017. Now aged 85, Reisenbauer continues to attend gugging's studio office every day. He accurately positions objects or other simple motifs next to and below each other with pencil and coloured pencil on paper, or acrylic and Edding marker on canvas.

The works of Kernbeis, Kamlander and Reisenbauer are today represented in numerous renowned international and national private as well as museum collections. The exhibition's accompanying publication "simply... art", edited by Nina Katschnig, is cowritten by curators Elsy Lahner, Miroslav Hal'ák and Irina Katnik, who all pay tribute to the three artists in their own very personal way.

Art traditionally called "naïve" is sometimes masked by a stubborn prejudice of being kitsch or trivial, but appreciation and regard of this dynamic art brut and instinctive art.

For several years, Bruno Montpied has tirelessly explored many variations of naïve art. Detached from external perception, the compositions of many pieces among his collection favour the imagination over reality, sometimes tending towards surrealism or abstraction.

Join Jeanine Taylor Folk Art for a group show with a wry lens focused on face jugs, folklore, haints, bottle trees, night creatures and other eccentricities found throughout the Deep South. *Southern Gothic* will showcase a wide array of topics and mediums with ten artists representing six states.

The term 'Southern Gothic' is usually attributed to literature, movies, music, and eccentric characters found in the deep south. Jeanine Taylor has asked ten artists to translate their interpretation of southern gothic into their chosen medium: wire sculpture, welded steel, acrylic paintings, and clay.

Project Art Works presents *Residential*, an exhibition developed in collaboration with Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art, in Gateshead. Following a year-long project of awareness raising and relationship building in the North East of England with Baltic, neurodiverse communities, artists and caregivers, *Residential* will culminate in an installation of artworks and film in Baltic's Ground Floor gallery.

Jenenne Whitfield Departs As AVAM Director

The Board of Directors of the American Visionary Art Museum has announced the departure of Jenenne Whitfield as director, effective immediately, one year into her tenure as the leader of Baltimore's beloved museum of outsider art.

Christopher Goelet, Chair of AVAM's board of Directors stated: "After an extensive review of issues essential to the strategic growth of AVAM, the Board of Directors decided to part ways with Jenenne Whitfield as director. While deeply unfortunate, the Board nonetheless appreciates Ms. Whitfield's contributions over the past year and wisnes her weil in her future endeavors."

The board has defined a shared leadership structure on an interim basis until 2024. Donna Katrinic, Director of Finance & Operations, will share responsibilities for the day-to-day operations of AVAM with Director of Development & Marketing Valerie Williams. AVAM's Founder and past Director Rebecca Hoffberger has agreed to return to AVAM in this period as Artistic Director to assist with curation and also support the further development of AVAM's endowment. The board will conduct an international search for Whitfield's replacement.


The museum's next yearlong exhibition, "If You Build It, They Will Come," opens October 7.


